The fraternity is awaking from winter along with the entire campus. Activity levels around College Green (Blanche Levy Park to you nitpickers) are up noticeably now that the icy weather has gone.

Activity in the chapter house is up as well with a new group of postulants undergoing the process of becoming new brothers. It is the largest postulant class in some time and these new arrivals bring a great deal of optimism to the undergraduates and alumni alike.

Although some new additions to the board, notably Jordan Gushurst '95 and Suresh Swaminathan '04, have brought energy and enthusiasm to our group, more alumni involvement is needed. Simply put, the Board needs your assistance. Apart from Alumni Day and Homecoming, we meet four other times per year. Please consider renewing your connection to the house if you are in a position to contribute your time and experience to the fraternity. I know that you will find it to be a rewarding effort.

On another note, sometimes "the more things change, the more they stay the same." Our status as an independently owned house remains challenging. Regular maintenance and

infrastructure upgrades must be self-funded. At the same time, the University retains jurisdiction over our recognition status and, therefore, has some input over residential requirements. After a recent tragedy at our neighbor, Phi Kappa Sigma, the University has requested that our house and six other houses bring stairwell guardrail heights up to code. These modifications require an increase in our center stairwell banister height (the Skulls accident involved a fatal fall from a center stairwell). While we are seeking the University's assistance in mitigating the financial impact of those changes, the situation demonstrates our ongoing need for resources to maintain the house. Springtime has most homeowners identifying necessary improvements and repairs. Imagine the undergraduates residing in your home for a long winter. Our need for your financial support should be readily apparent on that (somewhat frightening) reflection.

To recap: Your time and your money are all we ask. Whatever you do, renew you commitment and connection to our fraternity. Our value as a house is measured by the connections we make and maintain with each other.

Phi Phi Boasts Highest GPA in National Fraternity

Brothers Welcome Second Largest Pledge Class in Five Years

Our undergraduate chapter has stepped up substantially this past semester and rush period to help ensure the chapter's survival. Our rush this semester went excellently, although we experienced several unfortunate setbacks between the last rush event and the start of pledging.

This year, the undergraduate executive board completely redesigned the rush schedule eliminating events that were not attracting freshmen, like the rush semi-formal, and introducing new well-received events like paintball. The new rush schedule worked extremely well; all of our events were well attended, and those that attended had a great time. Throughout the process, brotherhood involvement was at the highest I have ever seen during my time at Alpha Chi Rho. Brothers were actively engaged in the process, taking kids out to dinner, and making sure that every rush had met the majority of our brotherhood. Our final rush meeting was

the only time in house history that I have witnessed every single undergraduate brother present at a meeting. Our motivation and planning paid off – at our final supper event, we had 20 rushes attend with the intention to pledge Alpha Chi Rho.

Unfortunately, things do not always work out as well as we would like. Several of our potential new pledges were academically ineligible to pledge, and others had family issues. A few kids were hypersensitive about their grades because they were trying to get into a dual degree program and needed a 3.9 GPA at the end of their freshmen year to qualify. These individuals have expressed interest in joining the house next fall. While such platitudes must be taken with a grain of salt, many of their friends are pledging this semester, so I am confident that we can add them to our ranks in the fall.

One week into pledging, we had 13 pledges and the focus was shifted from

recruitment to integration. We were all a little disappointed at the loss of so many potential new brothers in the final moments of rush, but we were resolved to assure that these 13 new brothers (still the second largest pledge class in the last 5+ years of the Phi Phi Chapter) understand the challenges ahead and want to be fully engaged in the house.

In other news, the Phi Phi Chapter GPA is the highest of any national AXP chapter and roughly 0.2 higher than the all-men's average at Penn. The university has not released the chapter rankings yet, but I am confident that academically we are now one of the strongest houses on campus, a drastic improvement from our position in the lower fifth last year.

What is the potential for real recovery? There is still a great need to remove tens of thousands of rubble-initially mostly by hand- and to build schools, medical clinics, employment opportunities, infrastructure and shelter. As an architect I

trained local engineers on the international standards for evaluation of earthquake damage to structures. Five hundred have been trained so far. I also designed a "transitional" core shelter that could be erected by a crew of three in one day. The earthquake/hurricane-resistant transitional shelter could become a permanent structure with added construction around the core. Over 1,000 of these had been built by the end of August- all using local labor- but, a drop in the bucket compared to the need.

"I was an active in AXP from 1949 till 1953, and lived in house for three years and was house mgr. During those years, Philadelphia closed South 36th Street, in order to construct the underground line. Since there was a very deep trench in front of the house, there was no way to get to Smokey Joe's. (At that time it was directly across 36th St from AXP). We rigged a wash line from the third floor front balcony across to Smokes. We would tie a pitcher (with money) to the line and send it across, where it would be filled with beer and returned.

Another story is about a group of brothers from classes 1951 thru 1956 that get together in Philadelphia every two years. We had 15 brothers, with wives, who met regularly; but our group had dwindled to about 9. We will continue, as long as some of us are still alive

One final remembrance...We had a party one Saturday night, with a band named Mike Pedicin. He was very popular, and we had more attendees than expected. Actually, we had so many, we had to put up braces in the basement, because we thought the first floor living room would collapse. Obviously, it was a GREAT party."

"One of my better memories from my fraternity days in the '50s was the night we stole the trolley at 38th and Spruce Streets. It took three of us. Two waited at the designated stop ready to get on the next trolley that came. The third was about 40 feet behind. The almost empty trolley stopped. With that, the trolley experienced a total blackout. The pole had mysteriously been pulled of the wire. The operator/conductor got out to walk to the back of the car to put the pole back on. With that the first two, who had carefully trained themselves to be temporary operators, closed the doors, turned the proper lever and sped off with the trolley, leaving the operator in our dust.

We went all the way down the hill (one block) to 34th Street, opened the doors and left a few confused passengers to wait for the real operator - who was then seen running down the street to take back his job. Just a prank, but I think it would be a little more difficult to pull off today. This event, plus swallowing live goldfish, is what got us accepted into Alpha Chi Rho."
