
ALUMNI REPORT

Preparing for the House's Centennial Anniversary *Brothers to Be Called On to Help Preserve Our Home at Penn*

Happy 95th birthday to the Phi Phi house! As we approach the 100th anniversary of the building of our house in 2017, we need to prepare for the preservation of our home at Penn. Our short-term expenses, covered by our annual fund, help us to maintain operations including our alumni relations program, events and chapter programming. We must raise at least \$10,000 annually toward that fund to keep our programs running year after year.

We are also gearing up for a larger capital fundraising effort to prepare our house



for its next hundred years. Our forthcoming Centennial Campaign will raise money for safety upgrades, electrical wiring, alarm and sprinkler systems, and structural improvements to the roof, floors and basement.

AXP Senior Humbled by Trip to Guatemala

Paul Barañano Spends a Summer Abroad

Travel - "fatal to prejudice, bigotry, and narrow-mindedness," as Mark Twain put it - can be as awakening a form of education as any class. At Penn, students utilize travel service trips to discover a world of experiences - humbling, inspiring, deeply foreign and sometimes shocking - apart from their own.

Ask Alpha Chi Rho senior **Paul Barañano** how meaningful these trips can be. This summer, he traveled to Guatemala for two weeks as part of an engineering service program, which built latrines in a small peasant village in the countryside. The experience, Barañano says, gave him a renewed frame of mind as he headed into his final year in college.

"I hate to use this word, but it was life-changing," said Barañano. "These guys wake

up at 5 a.m. when the sun comes up. And they work until it's too dark to see what they're doing... I complain about studying for two hours a day."

Intrigued by a spiritual experience his mother once had in Guatemala and fascinated by Mayan history, Barañano decided last year to take a course on sustainable development and Guatemalan culture. The class, a requirement to go on the trip, was aimed at teaching engineers about the trend of installing low-resource high-efficiency technology that can provide for basic needs in developing economies. His class wrote a 20-page proposal to build latrines and, this August, he, 11 fellow engineers and two professional mentors set out to the village of Pojomel to make the proposal a reality.

When he arrived, Barañano was shook by the degree of Pojomel's isolation and destitution. He discovered roughly 80 families impoverished of both physical resources and vital information such as the importance of boiling drinking water.

"It was remarkable just how poor it was... There was a schoolhouse with a little area to play and you thought this isn't too bad," Barañano described. "Then, you walked and saw where they lived and it was smaller than my room in AXP. Shacks, man. For six people. With just a door and a window."

Former VP Brings Greek Principles to Startup

Justin Mardjuki Launches Smartphone Application Company

By the time final council rolled around last semester and it was time to elect new officers for Alpha Chi Rho, brothers basically agreed that Vice President **Justin Mardjuki** had performed his job with excellence. He had helped organize the rush for the largest pledge class Phi Phi had seen in four years. He had stepped in for President **Will Doyle** several times while he was away on business, running meetings and organizing social events in his absence. And, in general, he had been a vital leader and logistical coordinator in the fraternity that would win “Most Improved Chapter” in the Alpha Chi brotherhood for the second consecutive year.

So, it was bittersweet – both for Mardjuki and AXP – that he would be taking only an informal role during his coming junior year, in part, so that he could spend more time on his rising startup company, TappMob, which creates smartphone applications for college students. For Mardjuki, however, his time as AXP VP was not wasted; he left after garnering a range of leadership skills that he has found invaluable in business.

“Last year, as VP, a lot of my job was just logistics. Making sure that everything was in place,” said Mardjuki. “It was really helpful this summer when I was trying to manage eight employees in an office.”

Since May 2011, when he and his close high school friend Eva Sasson started the company, Mardjuki has helped grow TappMob from a summer project to a company with thirty part- and full-time employees. A former Rusher of the Year, he

has cajoled everyone from programmers at Penn to venture capitalists into joining him in his mission of creating a profitable company.

According to **Ryan Sasson**, Vice President of Engineering at TappMob and a junior in the AXP brotherhood, the company has been able to grow, in part, because of its laid back frat-like atmosphere. Mardjuki has mainly networked through friends and, in doing so, has established a fun, productive work environment (not unlike Phi Phi). Sasson, a programmer, joined the company after receiving an open invitation from Mardjuki and his cousin Eva to help out. This summer Ryan worked for TappMob full time and, he says, never harder in his life.

“We were a little startup in this formal corporate office,” said Sasson. “We’d all show up in t-shirts and shorts...sometimes the corporate people would get mad.”

Mardjuki, for his part, is unapologetic about his cronyism.

“We had hundreds of applicants [for Sasson’s position], but what it came down to was that we wanted people we could trust,” said Mardjuki. “Sasson was a brother, so I knew I could trust him.”

TappMob recently came out with its first product, an app – TappBooks - that helps college students find and sell each other’s textbooks.

“Rather than trying to sell books back to the bookstore, you can post them online...It’s generally a lot cheaper than the bookstore or online,” he explained.

“We’ve got a really good response at

Wisconsin and Michigan,” he added. “People are using it.”

And it’s not just AXP flowing into TappMob. As Sasson – who was elected to house manager this year – tells it, the two organizations feed off each other.

“Personally, I would say that my experience at TappMob has helped me work at AXP. Working as a team at TappMob can be difficult. People have different skill sets. Knowing how to make compromises and sort out people’s specialties has so far been really useful as house manager.”

And as to how TappMob is currently marketing its product? More Greek connections. The company is hiring campus representatives – overwhelmingly fraternity and sorority members – to spread the word about TappBooks.

“Greek people are just more social. More interested in reaching out, and just know more people,” said Mardjuki. “It’s interesting to see how Greek values have influenced my professional life.”


