

Leading the Way for Our Future

Capital Campaign Jordan Gushurst '95 Shares Why We Need to All Bond Together to Preserve AXP and Enjoy the Lifelong Benefits It Offers

Jordan Gushurst '95 has played a big role in leading Phi Phi in his alumni years. He is cochair of the Centennial Campaign, a graduate board member, and project manager on the basement renovations. When he's not volunteering for AXP, he works as an independent software consultant for the energy industry, focusing on energy trading and risk management. In this Q&A, he shares a bit more about himself and why he is giving back to Phi Phi in such a big way.

Why do you choose to donate your time and volunteer as an alum?
